# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

### *Introduction:*

Panch Pargana Kisan College, Bundu was established in 1972. The college is situated in the lap of nature in the Chhotanagpur Plateau on National Highway - 33, Ranchi - Tata route, 43 Kilometer away from Ranchi, the capital of Jharkhand. "Dasam Fall", a famous water-fall is one of the natural beauties of this region. The famous "SUN TEMPLE is also located in Bundu. The college was converted into a constituent unit of Ranchi University in 1986. Here teaching upto graduation level both in Honours and Pass Course (as per CBCS course) in the faculty of Arts, Science and Commerce is imparted in the college.

The college follows the syllabus, curriculum and the annual calendar formulated by Ranchi University. The process of syllabus and curriculum is designed by the Board of syllabus committee through the participation of Dean, H.O.D. of P.G. Dept. of respective subject and experts. It is further passed by Academic Council.

The institution through H.O.Ds and teaching staff develops and deploys the following plans for effective implementation of the curriculum.

- Internal (MID SEM) and External (University) Examinations
- Seminars & Debates and Workshops
- Staff meetings

## **1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)**

### **Institutional Strength**

- Hostel Facilities for the poor students.
- Very Good infrastructure facilities in this campus.
- Solar Panels fitted for power back up and regular use.
- Co-curricular activities are organised which disseminate awareness and impart training and skill to the students.
- Value Orientation - P.P.K. College Bundu, which educates tribal and backward communities as well as other communities which are deprived of higher education facility due to poverty.
- This institution makes enormous effort to lead them towards the light of wisdom.
- Eco-Friendly Campus - The College is located in a hilly and peaceful environment which makes teaching and learning a memorable experience.
- Dedicated Staff- The commitment and dedication of the teaching and administrative staff help the college in realizing its objectives.
- Student Friendly Campus- Good teacher-student relationship is maintained in the campus. This helps teachers to identify the educational needs of the students and the problems they face. This helps students to have a freedom of mind and to arouse their critical aptitude.
- Additional Skill Acquisition Program - Students are given career orientation and training for acquiring additional skills with the help of external experts and coordinators who make all efforts to equip the students for employment.

### **Institutional Weakness**

- Rural Backwardness - The rural setting of the college negatively affects its growth when compared to colleges in towns and cities. Consequently, the college has less access to industrial environment and knowledge centers of major cities. It is distanced from several possibilities of cities and towns and companies rarely approach the college for campus placements.
- Low Cut-off Marks - Admission of low scoring students with poor learning skills and poor communicative skill in English are considered for the admission in degree courses.
- Shortage of Staff - Sufficient posts are not sanctioned by the Government in most of the departments

against approved student strength. Several sanctioned posts are vacant which can only be filled by the university and JPSC. This affects the quality of teaching.

### **Institutional Opportunity**

- Curriculum - The teachers in the college with expert skills are capable of making the curriculum easily understandable to slow learners.
- Tribal Community Leadership - In the Governing Board of the college, two-third members are from the Scheduled Tribe community. This gives an opportunity for the college to provide special care for the firstgeneration learners from tribal communities to pursue higher studies. Thereby college acts as a transforming force.
- Community College and Industrial linkages – The college has availed the novel scheme of Community college by UGC by opening new doors for industrial collaboration. This will enable students to find a secure job of their choice.
- Alumni – The alumni association could be revitalized to act as a resource and leadership base for the college in future.
- Innovative Programs – College follows many innovative and best practices in teaching and learning. Such programs provide learning at a core level to generate the critical thinking of students and to increase their interest in studies. The college has the provision of crèches (Palana) to take care of babies accompanied with either students or examinees. 'Eco club' of students has been formed to create eco-awareness among the students with the help of posters and making the college campus plastic free. Different cleanliness programs have also been organized to create eco-awareness in the nearby areas. The club has also organized a few debates.

### **Institutional Challenge**

- Government restrictions – Government restrictions on appointments result in shortage of staff for running the courses and administration smoothly and effectively.
- Drawbacks of University system – The Choice Based Credit System course ought to be properly supported by adequate number of teacher and proper infrastructure. There has been a demand by the local students for starting P.G. courses in the college. The university has made promises but it has not been implemented so far.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

#### *Curricular Aspects :*

The college offers diversified programs in Arts, Science & Commerce faculties. A Self Financing Program in Bachelor of Computer Application for the Arts, Science and Commerce students is running here. The aim is to encourage students to be able to obtain skills in computer application so that they can compete with the urban youth in this field. As per the guidance of Ranchi University, Ranchi, the College runs the NSS (National Society Service),NCC(National Cadet Corps) and personality development cell for the physical, mental, social and moral development of the students. Feedback from the stakeholders and their expertise Knowledge and

competence is utilized for development for higher studies, research, employability and entrepreneurship among students. Language courses are prescribed to gain proficiency in the languages. Core, Elective, Skill Based courses are introduced to attain knowledge focused for the employability, entrepreneurship and skill development. Value based and non-major elective courses are prescribed to instil human and social values. On par with the revamping of curriculum components, the faculty enriches their Academic Input and keeps abreast with the technological instructional support. Activities related to learning competences and performances are carried out leading to placement training and opportunities.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

#### *Teaching-learning and Evaluation :*

The college adheres to the university rules for admission to undergraduate courses. The number of SC, ST and OBC students is large in the college. Hence, teaching in the college is made easily accessible to the students from the said marginalized sections of the society. The academic calendar of the college is in adherence to the academic calendar of the university. The teaching plan of the departments is prepared by the concerned HODs and finalized in the staff meeting of the college under the chairmanship of the Principal. Before the commencement of regular classes, one day induction program is conducted for the newly admitted students. Evaluation at the departmental level is conducted to assess the learning ability and skill of the student.

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

#### *Research, Innovations and Extension :*

The college does not have any research Centre of the university. However, several teachers of the college have been supervising as Ph.D. guide under Ranchi University, Ranchi. Till now two Ph.D. have been awarded to Research scholars of this college, one in Botany and one in Zoology .Adequate facilities such as research oriented books/ journals/ e-journals/ computers/ laboratory equipments are provided for the students to pursue their Academic activities.

The Department of Botany has expertise in identification of plant and its nutritional values. So, some NGO's of Jharkhand have collaborated with the Department of Botany for hiring their services. For the benefit of rural students, there is collaboration between Department of Botany ,P.P.K.College ,Bundu and St.Xaviers College Ranchi for combined field visit, to visit each other laboratories and participation in Seminar of each other.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

#### *Infrastructure and Learning Resources :*

The policy of infrastructure and learning resources is suitable to the basic requirements of degree level higher education of this rural and tribal area. The college always tries its best to make its infrastructure better but it is dependent on the university for the same. A new building of college with all facilities is being built and may tentively be handed over by December 2020.

Adequate facilities are provided for the development of Sports Skills for the students at various levels in terms of Indoor and Outdoor Sports Fields, Gymnasium, fitness centre, etc. Rest rooms for women, Transport, Students Amenity Centre, Public interaction System etc. are available. Provisions of ramps with handrails for most of the buildings are available. Most of the labs are located in the ground floor. The Internet facility is available for all faculty and students in campus. For ease of access, the entire campus has been made Wi-Fi enabled. LCD projectors and Interactive Panel/smart digital boards are available for ICT enabled teaching. Computer with the internet facility are available for the use of students and faculty. All information related to academic and administrative activities are uploaded and updated regularly. The students at different levels use well-equipped laboratories in the Science Departments. The institution has an open auditorium with elaborate seating arrangement and a closed auditorium for conducting College union activities, various Association Meetings, seminars/conferences etc.

## **Student Support and Progression**

### *Student Support and Progression :*

A prospectus is published by the college to give information about process of admission, details about facilities as well as departments and facilities for the students. The college is very particular to promote extra and co-curricular activities which form an additional academic support. Teachers and coordinators facilitate such programs. The institution provides a number of mechanisms for student support and progression. A very important point to note is that even student leaders are elected based on their merit. The students are encouraged to participate in inter-collegiate, intra- and inter university sports tournaments and cultural competitions. Numerous numbers of State and National scholarships for the meritorious students are available for the benefit of the poor and needy. All the students belonging to SC/ST, and OBC communities are highly benefitted. The institution conducts soft-skill development, career counselling and personal enhancement sessions for the students by inviting external experts. Training and placement cell (CSC Centre) provides pre-placement guidance to the students. Special coaching and study materials for all the students who prepare for various competitive examinations are provided. Career counselling cell provides information to the students regarding the choice of career in different fields. E-Learning centre makes the e-contents available. Students with impaired vision are provided scribes. Grievance Cell looks into the grievances of students and proper solutions arrived. The college has an Anti-ragging and Anti-sexual harassment committee.

## **Governance, Leadership and Management**

### *Governance, Leadership and Management :*

The college is the center of higher education in a rural and tribal area with a vision of imparting quality education without any discrimination on the ground of caste, religion or gender. The college has many layers of leadership for fulfilling its vision and mission. The Principal is at the top of management which follows a practice of planning with the participation of teaching and non-teaching staff of the college in the light of the direction of the university. To ensure quality in the existing Academic and Administrative systems, an Internal Quality Assurance Cell is constituted and functioning in the institution. The IQAC not only monitors the quality aspects, but also plans the activities within the college and ensures quality education. Effective governance is made through various Statutory Bodies, the Governing Body, Academic Council, Boards of Studies and Finance Committee etc, and non-Statutory bodies like, Grievance Appeal Committee, Examination Committee, Admission Committee, Library Committee, Women protection and anti-sexual Harassment Committee, Anti-

Ragging Committee, Students Welfare Committee and Academic Audit Committee etc. are formed as another mechanism to ensure good governance. The leadership provides clear vision and mission to the institution. The functions of the institution and its academic and administrative units are governed by the principles of participation and transparency. Efforts are made to upgrade the professional competence of the staff. There are mechanisms evolved for regular performance appraisal of staff.

### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

#### *Institutional Values and Best Practices :*

P.P.K. College, Bundu, Ranchi has an environment conscious campus and all efforts are made with utmost caution to protect nature for future. There is an emphasis on the measures like energy conservation, planting of trees and waste management in the college campus. Bundu is a malaria prone area hence department of Botany has searched a mosquito repellent plant in this area which repels mosquitoes in live condition. Gender equity promotion, climate change and environmental issues are taken care of by the respective organizations and cells formed in the institution. Tanks are constructed at different places for rainwater harvesting. The college conduct Green audit, Energy Audit, Environmental Audit from reputed agency of Mumbai. NSS and NCC Unit of the college organised many social program in the college and outside the college. Solid/liquid and e-wastes are scientifically managed. Garden maintaining, tree planting, ban of plastics, dustbins are some measures adopted towards green practices. The institution has evolved many best practices that include mentor-mentee system, feedback analysis, office and examination automation, decentralized administration etc for the smooth functioning of the institution.

### Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary: Multidisciplinary or interdisciplinary learning process is provided a whole or comprehensive method that covers an idea, topic, or text by integrating multiple knowledge domains. From session 2023-24, it is the provision that ABC registration is compulsory for getting class Roll Number from the college. ABC is very convenient for the students to store the credit which they have earned, helpful for the inter-college, inter-university and interstate transfer of the academic's credits of the students and for further use.
3. ## 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

### 2.5.1

**Response:**

The institution is a constituent unit of Ranchi University. It adheres to the syllabus prescribed by Ranchi University. There is provision for both Internal Mid-Sem. Exam to be conducted by the concerned department of the college and Mid Sem. Exam conducted by the university. Both the evaluations together provide the final evaluation of students. The institution follows the guidelines provided by the university. The syllabus is discussed in detail with the students. Thereafter each topic is taught in detail and random test are taken to evaluate the performance of students. Teachers also discuss probable and important questions.

The objective questions and Multiple Choice questions are also discussed to enhance the knowledge of students. Evaluation is done both in theory and practical examinations. The students are given feedbacks about their performance and suggestions are given for their improvement.

**The following reforms have been carried out for CIE:**

1. Schedule of internal examinations is intimated to the students well in advance despite mentioning the same in the academic calendar and college website.
2. The syllabus for the internal examination is also communicated to the students in the class by subject teacher one week in advance and also displayed on the department notice boards as well as website.
3. To ensure transparency the students are required to write the internal examinations in the specific institutional embalmed answer papers provided by the institution.
4. The faculty is directed to prepare question paper as per the syllabus and the standard of the university question paper keeping in consideration the POs and COs.
5. The question papers are scrutinized by internal examination co-ordinators under the guidance of HODs.
6. The scheme of evaluation is prepared by the subject teachers.
7. Answer scripts, evaluated by the subject teachers are distributed to the students for any correction in marks, re-totalling, revaluation etc.
8. Marks will be recorded in the internal marks register and the marks are displayed on the department notice boards.
9. Poor Performance due to frequent absenteeism is dealt with by informing the parents of such students.
10. Parent-teacher meetings are conducted after every internal assessment and feedback about performance of students is discussed.
11. Robustness of internal assessment is reflected in advanced mentoring, Academic calendar, Grievance Redressal, internals marks uploading in the University portal.

**Response:**

The institution has a systematic process of collecting and evaluating data on program outcomes and course learning. This aids the institution to overcome the barriers to learning. The course outcome assessment is mainly based on random tests, Mid-Sem, Internal and External Examination, assignment, quiz and debate.

A) Random Tests : This type of test is carried out after the class. It is usually focussed on the chapters completed.

B) Mid-Sem Internal Examination is conducted by the faculty members to assess and evaluate the achievement of students.

C) End-Sem External Examination is conducted by the University. This examination is both objective and descriptive.

D) Assignments are given to each student which is related to syllabus. Suggestions are given to the students by faculty members for their improvement.

E) Rubrics are formulated for the assessment of laboratory, mini project, major project and seminar. The expected target level of course outcomes is set in the range of 50% - 70% based on cognitive level of CO by course instructor at the beginning of the semester. The performance of the student in examinations in each semester is computed for his improvement.

- **The EKC sponsors entrepreneurship related activities of the college**, such as the Innovation Club activities, Entrepreneurial events such as the Digital Productivity, Conclave, Communication Skill, Entrepreneurship, Emerging trends of business, Business practices survey, Start-up Pitch competition, Industrial tour and trips, Skill Development Courses, special lectures by entrepreneurs etc. and even finances innovation club students seed money for their business ideas.

## 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

#### Response:

The college reviews fund for salary and other development component from the government and U.G.C. The college has an elaborate mechanism for the maintenance and utilization of the funds. The college has different accounts to keep money for different purposes. There are University account / PF account / U.G.C. Account, Sports & Cultural Account, etc.

PPK College Bundu is constituent unit of Ranchi University and it has its own accounts wing. Financial advisor (Bursur) and Head Accountant Officer managed all accounts related works. He looks after the regular accounts of all the receipts for each financial year. The university control all financial issue. Financial Officer (FO) is the financial head of the university. He is also responsible for administrative control over the staff of accounts department and internal audit wing including checking squad. Transparency is strictly maintained in both Internal and External audit of the college.

#### INTERNAL AUDIT:

Internal audits of the Institution are carried out regularly twice in a year by our Internal Audit wing based on the accounts and records submitted by the college office. The audit wing consisting of

(Principal, Bursar, Accountant) conducts the internal audits and hands over the reports to the management. After a study of the report, the management instructs the concerned section to rectify the errors to set right the audit objections in tune with audit standards generally accepted in India. The audit includes the following.

- Comparing previous financial statements to the present ones.
- Verification of student's fee registers.
- Authorization of fee concessions, controls, policies.
- Verification of Cash book
- Review the means of safeguarding assets and as appropriate, verifying the existence of such assets.
- Examining bank passbook
- Verify the investments, grants from other bodies
- Admission record verification
- Verification of total amount granted for various departments and its utilization
- Checking the acknowledgment letters if any with regard to scholarship
- Examining the payments for maintenance and any other miscellaneous expenses
- Filling the Income Tax returns regularly

#### **EXTERNAL AUDIT:**

External Audits of the Institution are carried out regularly once in a year by state audit department (AG). The duly audited reports are submitted to the external audit team. The external audit team audits the college financial report. In case of any objections the Institution will deal with it promptly and takes necessary corrective measures in a completely transparent manner.

Precautions and measures for safety and security of girl students is taken all the time. For this purpose closed circuit cameras have been installed. There are Anti-Ragging Cell and Women Cell to entertain their complaints and provide fruitful suggestions even for their career. There is a separate Girls Common Room. The college is highly sensitive to the question of gender equity. The college is located in a rural area. Thus most of the girl students come from the deprived class. Their guardians and parents are unable to send their wards to distant colleges and they prefer to send their girl wards to the local college. Thus the number of girl students in this college is fairly high. The college administration is very sensitive to the safety, security and well being of girl students. As a result of which there has been no complaint or report of sexual harassment of girl students in the college. This achievement has been made due to proper co-ordination between administration, teaching and non-teaching staff and students. Minor misunderstandings between boys and girls have been amicably solved.

The Institute shows gender sensitivity in providing facilities such as:

- Common Room
- Programs for progress

#### **Safety and Security:**

- The college campus is fully protected by compound wall around the campus and trespassers are not allowed without permission.
- There is 24X7 hours security in the college.
- The Institution ensures security of all students, staff and visitors by providing regular security checks at the entrance.
- An identity Card is mandatory for all students and staff at all times on campus.
- The security is managed by college which is provided by the Jharkhand Govt.
- This ensures safety of the students especially girl students and women faculty.
- During the study tours, field visits and college fests, a lady staff will accompany girl students.
- All first year students are given an orientation about complaint Redressal mechanism available in the college like Anti-Ragging cell, Anti-sexual harassment cell and Grievance Redressal Cell.

- Complaint Box is installed in the college building and its follow up is taken by the Grievance Redressal Cell.
- All corridors and Labs are equipped with fire extinguishers.

**Counselling:**

- Counseling is an important aspect to address the problems related to psychological, social, emotional, family issues, subject related stress, examination phobia etc.
- Mentor –Mentee system is introduced to deal with the same. A mentor is allocated per 50/60 students as a part of the mentoring activity.

**Response:**

### **Best Practices 1**

**TITLE: - A Social Awareness Campaign by N.S.S. Unit and village adoption. The main objectives are:**

- To increase community awareness through NSS.
- To introduce voluntary work.
- To motivate the students for responsible leaders.
- To introduce team work in the society.
- To organise awareness programs for all through NSS.
- To help and coordinate to others in society.

#### **GOALS:-**

Making the villagers aware of the factors adversely affecting their progress.

Developing proximity of the college students with the villagers and strengthening bond between them by organizing a special camp by NSS.

By adopting a village, to maintain consistency in conducting social activities and also to get desired results.

#### **CONTEXT:-**

Bundu is the very backward area of Ranchi district as well as state Jharkhand. In the past few decades, the government has launched and implemented various welfare, upliftment schemes and awareness programs for the rural people. But due to lack of awareness, effective execution and result oriented mechanism, the desired goal could not be achieved . The overall progress of the villagers living in remote, and Naxal affected area is still restrained by various factors. Owing to lack of information, ignorance and outreach awareness programmes, life of these villagers is still encircled by various problems. This grim ground reality got reflected when the Anthropology department conducted a field work and special survey in the village BARUHATU & JADIYA. An awareness programme on illiteracy, health issues related to unhygienic living conditions, alcoholism, superstitious outlook, adherence to traditional modes of farming, negligence towards banking system etc. are some of the issues restraining

the progress of the villagers that compelled us to organize an awareness campaign specially targeting these issues to bring about a change in outlook of the villagers. Moreover, such targeted activities would surely be helpful in sensitizing the students to pay back to society and to develop some of the vital skills among them.

### **PRACTICE:-**

The students of Sociology, Geography department and N.S.S. volunteers conducted a specific survey to collect the responses from the villagers of BARUHATU, JADIYA village highlighting their life style and outlook.

The analysis of the outcome of the survey helped in selecting the topics of discussion and interaction with the villagers that provided a base for organizing an awareness campaign.

A special residential NSS camp was organized at the village Baruhatu, Jadiya with 50 volunteers, apart from performing their routine activities, started communicating, interacting with the villagers to enhance their participation and other activities organized for them.

Awareness, like, Nasa mukti, blood donation awareness, literacy awareness, swachhta, awareness, program, and guidance and counselling sessions, entertainment Nukad-Natak programmes were organised during special camp.

Dr. Aradhna and Dr. Tarkeshwar Kumar delivered a lecture on eradication of Superstition-Need of an Hour, aiming at bringing in awareness among the villagers about superstitions and blind faiths.

NSS Volunteers and the staff members along with the villagers carried out a cleanliness drive every day before the beginning of the camp.

### **EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS**

A change in villager's attitude towards cleanness was clearly evident.

Calls and invitations were received from the villagers to the college to organize more training and guidance sessions on Yoga and Pranayam.

The participated students appeared more sensitized and motivated as their participation in other social activities, conducted by college enhanced.

The organizational skill among the students appeared to be enhanced while organizing various programmes in the college.

### **PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED:-**

Participation of the villagers was comparatively less during day time owing to their engagement in agricultural activities.

Attitude of most of the villagers to blame the government machinery for every wrong led to dull response in the beginning of the campaign.

## Practices II

### 1. Title of the Practice

#### **Maintain Professional Ethics and Local Tribal and Backward upliftment.**

2. The teachers maintain professional ethics and contribute as much as they can for the upliftment of students who belong to the deprived socio-economic group. The college is located in a rural and tribal area. More than 60% of students belong to ST, SC & other Backward communities. The college takes special effort to admit more students of ST category on the vacant category seats every year.

### 3. The Context

The challenging issues faced by the college is the lack of adequate number of teachers in each department. The limited number of teachers are mobilized to achieve the goal of upliftment of students who are deprived of opportunities for higher education.

### 4. The Practice

There is Special Enrolment Drive for Tribal Students and Teachers are regularly encouraged to maintain their performances in spite of facing some problems like lack of adequate number of teachers and proper infrastructure.

### 5. Evidence of Success

The stress on the importance of Professional Ethics and Local Tribal and Backward upliftment has resulted in enrolment of students from Tribal and other backward communities in the college. The college has become a model with such a large number of students in Ranchi University and opening doors of higher education to students who belong to deprived socio-economic group.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required. The college is a constituent unit of Ranchi University. The college faces the problem of inadequate number of teachers in most of the Departments. There is lack of proper infra-structure. The college is not authorized to appoint Teaching and Administrative staff. There is no relaxation of workload for teachers engaged in research activities. There is lack of confirmation and promotion for most of the teachers who have been working for a long duration. Special financial support schemes are required for the college to achieve its goal of maintaining upliftment of students for higher education.

A written proforma of Professional Ethics for Teachers should be adopted : what kind of ethic is expected from them alongwith the security and privilege that should be granted to them. Thus it should be adopted and implemented in the Best Practice in other Institutions. The basic aim of all Institution is the upliftment of students and guiding them from the world of darkness to light.

Since its establishment in 1972, the institution has made a bench mark in academic scenario by producing toppers and capable human resource. As institution is determined for the promotion education in girl children, so as the girl students proved themselves in studies as well as sports. Several times the girl students of this institute topped in the list of university in various subjects so as in sports and games.

## 5. CONCLUSION

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### Additional Information :

P.P.K. College Bundu is an old college, established in the year 1972 by the donations of people of Panch Pargana area and local politicians. Before this college students who desired to get higher education were deprived of that facility because of poor back ground and availability of the college which was at least 43 KM. away from this area. Infrastructure developed were not up to the mark but solving the basic need of education. Latter on in 1986 Government of Bihar decided to convert this college as a constituent unit of Ranchi University. Students of this area are mostly tribal and of backward community. After being a constituent college no attention had been given to this college to improve the infrastructure. The old building is gradually being ruined, after several representations & interference of politicians, students and efforts of college administration a new building ( a model college G+2) has been sanctioned . Soon it will be handed over after six-seventh months then college will run properly. There is also shortage of teachers and staffs due to no fresh appointments have been done by University and Government. Head of the institution has not such power to appoint any one. Some teachers are appointed as contractual basis to solve the educational problems. So the college was planning to go for the accreditation after receiving the new building but it is compulsory to go for the accreditation So we are proceeding for the same.

### Concluding Remarks :

P.P.K. College, Bundu, the temple of learning educates tribal and backward communities as well as other community and leads from darkness to marvelous light. The college is located in the hilly and calm environment that gives calm ambience to make teaching and learning in the campus a memorable experience. The commitment and dedication of teaching and administrative staffs help the college in realizing its objectives. Good teacher-student relationship is maintained in the campus. This helps teachers to identify the educational needs of students and problems they face. This helps students to have freedom of mind and to arouse their critical aptitude.

The rural setting of college negatively affects its growth when compared to college in town and cities. Consequently college has less access to industrial and knowledge centers of major cities and is distanced from all possibilities of city and town and companies rarely approach the college for placement. Admission of least scored students with poor learning skill and poor communicative skill in English.

College being a constituent college it is not financially independent for the maintenance of existing infrastructure and construction of new once could not be done in accordance with the increasing present days needs. The infrastructure of science practical laboratories is very poor and is not up to mark. Building and class rooms at present are not sufficient to accommodate the large number of students. There is lack of examination hall, conference hall, auditorium hall for cultural programmes. Although after several efforts a new building construction is sanctioned , this will be soon handed over within a year.

We envisage many solitary measures for developing infrastructure of the college for provision of e-library, playground, auditorium hall, conference hall, science building and well equipped science laboratories for science faculties. Separate chambers for each departments will be developed. After development of infrastructure new vocational courses will be introduced.
